Remarks from the Judges

Robert and Pat Newton thanked the Branch for inviting them to judge, and commented that the teams were to be congratulated on a very creditable standard of ringing. Well done to all.

The judges had familiarised themselves with the bells by joining the general ringing over tea, and thought that an unevenness of sound inside the ringing chamber would make it difficult for the lighter bells to strike well. The ropes were of varying lengths, and the 2nd so short they would surely have no problem cutting in!

Listening outside, the tenor seemed odd struck, being slow at hand. Many bands had some difficulty with this, and the tenor is a very important bell! 1 and 2 found difficulty partly because tenor was late. Pat and Robert hoped their comments would be constructive and helpful.

Team A. Woughton – Grandsire Doubles, 43 faults

Interesting that their practice method was different to that chosen for the test piece! Good positive ringing, with leading sometimes rather on the brisk side. Generally a good piece.

Team B. Loughton - Plain Bob Doubles, 56 faults

This ringing was rather a cautious piece. A little hesitant, and ringing round each other a bit.

Team C. Olney – Plain Bob Minor, 85 faults

It was a bold decision for this band to ring Minor. There was some difficulty in the rounds, and then some quite inaccurate parts in the test piece. A good patch half way through, but this was not maintained.

Team D. Shenley – Plain Bob Doubles, 64 faults

There was a good positive rhythm to this ringing. Most faults were picked up round the half lead and lead end.

Team E. Hanslope - Plain Bob Doubles, 93 faults

This test piece suffered from a rather irregular rhythm, with the striking varying a bit. One handstroke lead was very wide.

Team F. Branch Officers – Cambridge, 54 faults

A good positive effort from this band. As with Team C, a bold and brave choice. There was a hint of a method mistake at one point. An enjoyable piece of ringing, but they should have rung doubles to win!

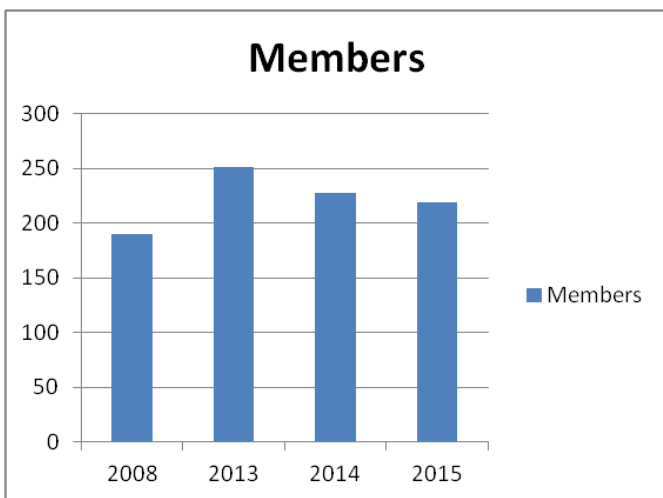

Your branch needs you - Recruitment Training and Retention

Can you believe it has now been 3 ½ years since the Big Ring Pull project delivered it's recruitment drive in Middleton Hall Milton Keynes. The BRP was a great success we still have two towers where the bells were silent before the BRP that are now regularly rung and 20 of the 42 people who attended the intensive 2 week training course in Newport Pagnell have continued to ring and are progressing well with their ringing development.



With membership now beginning to fall, it's time for us to concentrate ourselves on recruitment, training and retention once again. As membership is only one part of the story we are conducting a tower census and the results of this will be shared at the Autumn Meeting. A quartet of officers (Linda, Lesley, Shelia and Patricia) has been looking into the best practices and learns from across the ringing community in respect of recruitment, training and retention. What this research has demonstrated is that we need to need to develop a constant yet flexible self-sustainable model for recruitment training and retention that appeals to a 21st Century society.

From Towers to Trenches, we remember them.....

In this edition of in touch we will remember the lives of two bell ringers from North Bucks who died on the same day, 25th September 2015 in the line of duty.

George William Spiers - Bradwell

The deathly silence is broken by buglers at 8pm sharp, the familiar notes of the last post echo around the Menin Gate in Ypres. The last post is played each evening since the tradition began in 1928 as a tribute to the memory of the many soldiers who fought and fell in the Ypres Salient so many years ago. The Menin Gate Memorial to the Missing bears the names of 54,389 officers and men from the United Kingdom and Commonwealth Forces (except New Zealand and Newfoundland). Among the names engraved on stone G in bay 39 is Spiers WG [sic] a search in the memorial's register provides a little more detail "SPIERS [sic] Pte William George 18411. 5th Bn Oxf Bucks Light Inf. 25th Sept., 1915."

William was the 4th known child of Arthur and Elizabeth Spiers and was born in the summer of 1896 in Old Bradwell possibly Loughton Road where the family lived in 1891. Arthur was employed as a labourer on a local farm and was born and bred locally in Old Bradwell. Mother, Elizabeth nee Lennard was born in Little Horwood and the couple were married in 1888.

In 1901, the family were living "next to" the "post office", Arthur was aged 36 while his wife was 3 years his senior. The children Hilda age 11, Sarah age 10, Arthur age 8 and William age 5 were presumably all attending the local school.

Fast forward to 1911, the census record completed by Mrs Arthur Spiers shows that father, Arthur was employed as a "Cowman on farm", while his daughter Sarah was employed in a printing works and his elder sons Arthur and William had been taken on as apprentices with a brick layer and house painter respectively. Hilda was perhaps one of the two children to have died before the 1911 census. The home they lived in was still near the post office and contained 4 rooms including kitchen but excluding any scullery, landing, lobby, closet or bathroom. Around this time William rang the bells at ST Lawrence, Bradwell.

While the service records for William do not appear to have survived The Blitz it is likely that he was killed on the first day of the Battle of Loos (25th Sept – 18 Oct 1915). The web site Lightbobs.com has transcribed a copy of the 5th Battalion's action during the First World War, this document recounts that the battalion was assembled by midnight on the 24th expecting to commence the attack on Bellewaarde farm at 4.20am it gives details of how the battle developed during the course of the day and devastating result of one day's action, 13 out of 15 officers and 463 out of 767 other ranks had lost their lives. William amongst the 463 was most likely a member of the left column which was heavily shelled at the beginning of the battle.

Anthony Joseph Fennemore - Leckhamstead

On the 3rd December 1910 the local ringers of The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Leckhamstead rang their first peal of Grandsire Doubles which took 2 hours and 54 minutes on 5 bells. At that time Leckhamstead belonged to The Towcester and District branch of church bell ringers. The peal was conducted by Dennis Carter who rang the 13-2-0 tenor, the treble was rung by 25 year old Anthony Fennemore.

Anthony was born in Leckhamstead to parents William and Margaret, he was one of 11 children born to the couple of which nine were still living at the time of the 1911 census. Anthony was employed as a farm labourer in 1911 as his father was before him. Being the youngest surviving child Anthony was the only one still at home in 1911, his parents were in their 70's and were classified as old age pensioners. The Old Age Pensions Act of 1908 introduced the concept of a means tested state pension for those aged 70 and over from 1909, Anthony's parents were probably one of the first couples to have qualified by earning less than £21 per annum.

Anthony enlisted in Buckingham and became a private in the Gloucestershire Regiment 10th (Service) Battalion. The 10th Service Battalion landed in France 8th August 1915 on the 17th August it transferred to the 1st Brigade in the 1st Division who were involved in the Battle of Loos between the 25th September and 18th October 1915.

The website 1914-1918.net gives a detailed account of role the 1st division played it states that the "lead Battalions (10/Gloucester and 8/R. Berkshires... advanced through all objectives despite heavy casualties. One of the casualties was 30 year old Anthony who is commemorated as one of the missing on the Loos Memorial which forms the sides and back of Dud Corner Cemetery.

We will be commemorating the lives of both this ringers by lighting the branch memorial candle at our Autumn Meeting on the 26th September.

So, if anyone wears a big fashionable watch, it might be safer to take it off before ringing to avoid any possible mishaps.
